

Task: Skin Structure – Round Robin

Tutor Notes

This is a whole class activity you can do to revise skin diseases & disorders.

Print out the cards (see below). Give one to each student. Each card has an answer and a question printed on it.

One person starts by reading out the question on their card. The person who has the answer on their card reads it out and then reads out the question and so on until everyone has answered and asked a question. You should finish with the person who asked the first question.

<p>Answer: Pustules</p> <p>Question: Bacterial infection at the base of the eyelash follicle</p>	<p>Answer: Styne</p> <p>Question: Small areas of pigmentation otherwise known as freckles</p>
<p>Answer: Ephelides</p> <p>Question: Raised, shiny area of skin</p>	<p>Answer: Keloid scar</p> <p>Question: Solid, raised areas containing bacterial infection but no visible fluid</p>
<p>Answer: Papule</p> <p>Question: Fungal infection passed by direct or indirect contact. Raised, red area in the shape of a ring</p>	<p>Answer: Tinea Corporis (Ring worm)</p> <p>Question: Irregular shaped patches of hyperpigmentation. Usually found on the mouth and upper cheek area</p>
<p>Answer: Chloasma</p> <p>Question: Bacterial infection of the membrane lining the eye.</p>	<p>Answer: Conjunctivitis</p> <p>Question: Pockets of sebum trapped under the skin. Appear white in colour.</p>
<p>Answer: Milia</p> <p>Question: Red veins visible through the skin</p>	<p>Answer: Broken capillaries</p> <p>Question: Bacterial infection of the skin. Skin is red and itchy. Blisters form leading to thick yellow crusts</p>
<p>Answer: Impetigo</p> <p>Question: Infestation of a tiny mite which burrows beneath the skin. Appears as wavy greyish lines on the skin.</p>	<p>Answer: Scabies</p> <p>Question: Excess sebum blocking the mouth of a pore. The top oxidises and turns black</p>
<p>Answer: Comedone</p> <p>Question: Patches of completely white skin which have lost their pigment.</p>	<p>Answer: Vitiligo</p> <p>Question: Patches of itchy, red, flaky skin covered in silvery scales</p>
<p>Answer: Psoriasis</p> <p>Question: Small lice parasites live and feed on body skin</p>	<p>Answer: Pediculosis</p> <p>Question: Yellowish topped, small pus filled lesions</p>
